About U-Report Poll on Climate Crisis



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Children and young people have taken independent action around the world to address the climate crisis, but their potential is limited due to the lack of adequate resources and opportunities to develop green skills. Furthermore, despite the fact that children are the ones who will experience the most future impacts of climate change, their participation in processes and events where critical climate-related decisions are made is limited.

➤ Ahead of the United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP28) and its Presidency focusing on youth skills and education, the poll conducted through the U-Report platform focused on whether children and young people have the resources to cope with the effects of climate change.

> The results of the poll will feed into the Global Youth Consultation and Global Youth Statement to be presented at COP28, providing a unique opportunity for the voice of young people to be heard by world leaders.



What is U-Report?

empower adolescents and young people to express their views on issues that concern them and encourage their democratic participation.

The results of the polls aim to contribute to the awareness of the communities, but also to influence policies and programs concerning children and young people.

The poll "*What do children and young people think about the climate crisis*" was conducted from **July to September 2023** and 422 children and young people from all over Greece participated.

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Have you learned about the climate crisis at school?

The majority of participants stated that they did not learn at all or did not learn enough about the climate crisis at school.

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2/3 of children consider that they do not receive adequate climate education at school

In response to whether they feel they are receiving the appropriate education and equipping them with the appropriate skills to respond to climate change and its impacts, the majority of children said no. It is noteworthy that in the **20-24 age group**, who have now completed their schooling, the percentage who answered negatively increases, reaching **75%**.
